A SHORT HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK ASTRONOMICAL CORPORATION AND THE ASTRONOMICAL SOCIETY OF NEW YORK

ABSTRACT: The New York Astronomical Corporation was created in 1968 by a group of New York State astronomers who were interested in building a large telescope for the use of New York astronomers. Curtis Hemenway lead the effort, forming a committee in 1967 to look into the idea of raising funds for a new observatory. For five years a concerted effort was made to raise funds for the building and operation of a 150-in telescope. The site chosen was Hawaii. During the period of our campaign funds for astronomical projects were becoming more difficult to obtain and in 1973 we ceased the fundraising effort.

During the five years NYAC held many meetings at which students and staff gave papers. We decided to continue this part of our activities and in 1973 the Astronomical Society of New York was formed. All the astronomers and students at a NYAC institution automatically became a member of ASNY. The dues paid to NYAC helped fund the activities of ASNY. The main activity of ASNY was to hold two meetings each year for the purpose of exchanging information among New York astronomers about their research activities. Prizes were set up for the best student papers and we helped fund trips to observatories for observations by students. The review papers at the meetings, and abstracts of the contributed papers, were published in the News Letter of the Astronomical Society of New York.

1. THE NEW YORK ASTRONOMICAL COUNCIL

This was the group set up by Hemenway to explore the idea of building and operating a large optical telescope for New York astronomers. Representatives from eight universities and colleges attended the first meeting which was held at SUNY Albany in November of 1967, The second meeting was held at Columbia University and and we decided to incorporate the group and to submit a proposal to the New York State Technology Foundation for a feasibility study. At the third meeting, held at Mees Observatory in June of 1968 the charter of NYAC was signed and notarized.

2. THE NEW YORK ASTRONOMICAL CORPORATION

The first meeting of NYAC was held at Cornell University in November of 1968. There were eighteen astronomers from twelve New York State institutions in attendance. The sixth annual meeting was held at the University of Rochester in November of 1972. In this period of time we wrote a proposal for funds to build an observatory, had a meeting with five outside reviewers and looked for sources of money. Some of the NYAC institutions made commitments of funds, provided that other institutions also made similar offers of support. In 1971 we modified our proposal and asked for support for a more modest telescope. There was a possibility of joining with Tom Gehrels at the University of Arizona in constructing a 70-in telescope, but again the necessary funds to carry out this project were not obtained.

3. THE ASTRONOMICAL SOCIETY OF NEW YORK

At the seventh meeting of NYAC/ASNY, held at Syracuse University ASNY was formally set up. A new Board of Directors was appointed. It was decided to hold two meetings each year; the fall meeting would be held by Union College and RPI, in rotation. The spring meeting would be held at the various member institutions as invitations were received. It was decided to publish the News Letter of the Astronomical Society of New York which would contain the text of the review papers at each meeting and abstracts of the

contributed papers. The fiftieth issue is scheduled to be published for the Fall, 2001 meeting which will be held at Union College. The Board set up the Graduate Student Prize to be awarded for the best paper submitted by a graduate student at one of the NYAC institutions. At the ninth annual meeting, held in Schenectady, the Board set up a student grant program to help students to get to observing runs at non-NYAC observatories. At the start the grants were set at a level of \$300 per trip and were raised to \$500 per trip some years later.

In 1981 ASNY held a two day meeting at Colgate University on the subject, "X-Ray Symposium - 1981". The proceedings were published by the L. Davis Press. In 1988, at the 21st meeting, the Board set up a new prize, the Undergraduate Student Prize, to be awarded for the best undergraduate research paper submitted to the prize committee.

The 25th Anniversary Meeting was held at Cornell University April 23 - 25, 1992. Sixty-nine astronomers attended. 18 review papers and 14 poster papers were given at the meeting. The proceedings were published by the L. Davis Press in a volume entitled, "New York State Astronomy".

Since 1992 ASNY has continued organizing the two scientific sessions each year, awarding the graduate student and undergraduate prizes and giving travel support to students going on observing trips. Several tables and graphs are presented in the section, TABLES & PLOTS. In Table 1 the officers of NYAC and the number of institutional members are presented. In Table 2 the winners of the Graduate and Undergraduate Prizes are listed. Table 3 contains the names of students who received travel support for an observing trip. Table 4 contains the record of meetings. Table 5 lists the names of the Invited Speakers at Fall and Spring meetings.

There are eight plots. The first plot shows the length of the terms of the various officers of NYAC. The next shows the distribution of the sites of meetings. Since the fall meeting is held at Union College or R.P.I., these two institutions have the greatest number of meetings. The next plot shows the distribution of prizes by institution. The fourth plot shows the distribution of Invited Speakers by institution. Non-NYAC institutions appear in this plot, with Yale having the greatest number of invited speakers for a non-NYAC institution. The fifth plot shows the invited speakers who have given the most papers. The sixth, bottom plot shows the number of institutions which are members of NYAC, by year. The seventh plot shows the length of the terms of the astronomers who have served as Institutional Representatives for NYAC. The eighth and last plot shows the growth of funds placed in the Certificates of Deposit from 1971 to 2001.

4. CONCLUSIONS

Over the years ASNY has been successful in providing a forum for students to give their first papers before a scientific gathering. The prizes honor the best work of graduate and undergraduate students. And the travel support has helped a large number of students (graduate and undergraduate) to go on observing trips. The invited talks at the meetings cover a wide range of topics and help to inform the New York community of astronomers of recent astronomical developments. The News Letter of ASNY provides a permanent record of these activities. ASNY has provided a way for New York astronomers to keep in contact and to be aware of the various research projects underway at each institution.




Fig. 1. The terms of the officers of NYAC from 1968 - 2001




Fig. 2. The number of meetings at NYAC Institutions.




Fig. 3. The distribution of the ASNY Prizes by Institution.




Fig. 4. The distribution of Invited Speakers by Institution.




Fig. 5. The Invited Speakers who have given the most papers.




Fig. 6. The number of institutions which are members, by year.




Fig. 7 The number of terms of Institutional Representatives of NYAC.




Fig. 8. The growth of funds in the CoDs from 1971 - 2001.
