CURRENT RESEARCH

The Role of Civil Society in Chinese Environmental Protection. Research into the role of Civil Society in environmental protection in China. This involves studying Chinese public participation in environmental protection via Chinese environmental non-governmental organizations as well as via street committees and other forms of group organization.

Evaluating the impact of crises on state-civil society relations. The goal is to understand the impact of crises on the shifting balance of power between the state and society. I am currently co-editing a book that will deal directly with this relationship.

Evaluating the effectiveness of Public Health Networks - Lessons for the US from the Chinese and Taiwanese experience with SARS. A collaborative project between St. Louis University Institute for Bio-Security and SUNY New Paltz. We will develop policy recommendations for the US public health network based on the Chinese and Taiwanese experience with infectious diseases, specifically SARS. Data collected will be incorporated into a comparative study of responses to the spread of infectious diseases. How do these countries respond to the SARS epidemic? What contributed to China's relatively successful control of the outbreak and Taiwan's seeming failure? What lessons do these experiences hold for the US? This project is expected to run at least through Fall 2007.
